Our beautiful, can-do community is comprised of the two small settlements of Gresford and East Gresford, plus the lovely villages of Vacy, Torryburn, Lostock, Eccleston, Halton, Lewinsbrook, Mount Rivers, Fishers Hill and Summer Hill.

We are located 196 km north of Sydney and 40 km north of Maitland within the Dungog Shire Council. We are a service centre to a district community of 925 persons. Prior to the colonial period, the Gresford area was occupied by the Gringai clan. The first non-indigenous settlers in the district were timber cutters who began extracting cedar in the 1810's. The Gresford District was initially settled by Welsh immigrants including Charles and William Boydell who named Gresford after their Welsh hometown.

Gresford was one of the earliest wine producing areas in Australia with grapes being planted on properties like Camyr Allyn in the early 1830's. Henry Lindeman, one of Australia's most famous winemakers established vineyards in the district in 1843.

Traditionally, Gresford evolved as a major dairy centre with where cream was taken by "cream boats from Gresford to Duckenfield where a butter factory was established. Today, beef cattle and vineyards are the dominant agricultural pursuits, with the tourism, mining and timber industry vital employers.

Besides our ongoing importance as an agricultural district, Gresford has become an important tourism base for exploring our stunningly beautiful environments of Allynbrook, Lostock Dam, Mt Allyn with it's mountainous terrain, rainforests of Chichester State Forest and Barrington Tops., Gresford is located at the southern edge of the Barrington Tops National Park.

Our community has a reputation for its proactive attitude. It has many thriving Community Organisations, which include but not limited to Gresford Bowling Club, Gresford Vacy Football Club, Gresford District Community Group (GDCG), Gresford District Landcare Group, Gresford Amateur Performing Society (GAPS), Gorgeous Gresford Mural Project, Gresford and Districts Agricultural Society, Gresford Rodeo and Campdraft, Paterson River Pony Club, Gresford Rural Fire Service, Gresford News, Gresford Park Trust, Gresford Country Women's Association and Paterson Allyn Garden Group. These essential volunteer groups make things happen and gives Gresford it's special sense of community.

- Limited housing availability, senior housing and affordable rental accommodation.
- Lack of visitor accommodation options.
- Poor condition of road networks and potholes.
- Volunteer fatigue and declining numbers.
- Key Gresford groups- GDCG and CWAstruggling with membership engagement.
- Appeal of mining employment- skilled staff shortage.
- Decline in school numbers.
- Proximity of larger regional centres that act as 'Sponge Towns' drawing services and employment.
- Retail/cafe shop hours.
- Mother nature- drought, flood and fire.
- High club and event insurances.
- Lack of local transport options.
- Limited early childhood services and supports.
- Small town negative talk.
- · Poor connectivity.
- Limited support for mental health challenges.
- Condition of many of the Showground buildings.
- · Limited community pathway connections.
- · Engagement with NPWS.
- Lack of a local Tourism Strategy.
- Lack of appreciation of the tourism significance of the Barrington Tops.
- Closure of the local coal and power industry.
- Climate change.


