Our Story



Our can-do and thriving community of Kulin is in the Eastern Wheatbelt region of Western Australia, approximately 280 kilometres from Perth.

Our community of Kulin forms part of the traditional lands of the Njaki Njaki group, one of the fourteen dialectical groups of the Noongar aboriginal people of the South West Region of Western Australia. The name 'Kulin' is derived from the Aboriginal word 'Coolin' which was given to Sir John Septimus Roe by local Aboriginal guides to describe the area now known as Kulin Rock on his 1848-49 expedition to examine the South Coast.

In the 1870's, sandalwood cutters had begun cutting tracks across the district to harvest the sweet, scented wood for export to Asian markets, but soon abandoned their efforts in search of gold further inland. By 1905, the first pastoralists had taken out leases and so began a thriving agricultural industry in the region. The town of Kulin developed after the railway connection from Narrogin was established in 1915. Kulin Hotel opened for business in 1919 and the Memorial Hall was opened in 1928. In 1932, the Wheat Pool of Western Australia decided that local wheat silos would be installed with two engine operated grain elevators at the railway siding.

Back in 1994, our community faced uncertain times due to declining population and loss of services. The Community came together for a facilitated conversation with the theme: "Where is Kulin going? Don't put your future of the town in the hands of others – take control of your own destiny!" That event identified a preferred future and a wide range of community-led initiatives focused on 'Becoming a more that a dot on the map' and 'Building local pride and commitment.'

Today our Kulin community remains one of the most productive wheat and sheep farming districts in the West Australian Wheatbelt.

Many community-driven actions have occurred. Our annual Kulin Bush Races started in 1995 has become a popular regional attraction along with our iconic and beloved 'Tin Horse Highway'.

The determination and personal effort of our locals to bring the biggest waterslide in regional Australia to Kulin was another illustration of our dedication and commitment to our future.

Our Vision

A vibrant, caring, connected, safe and proactive community that takes the lead in creating our future.

Our Goals

Community goals are broad statements of intent that direct our efforts towards accomplishing our vision in line with our guiding principles.

Below are the six community goals which guide our community aspirations, namely -

- To develop a community where people of all ages and abilities are active, connected and contributing.
- To actively promote and showcase our community as a great place to stop, stay, experience, and reside.
- To actively pursue new economic and entrepreneurial opportunities that strengthen and diversify our local economy, business life and local employment opportunities.
- To create an environment where our young people feel involved, supported and empowered, and will consider returning to our community for work, business, family and lifestyle opportunities.
- To support, promote and celebrate active community participation and volunteerism.
- To retain strong sporting and cultural clubs, competitions, facilities, and traditions.



Theme One

Youth Retention and Attraction

ACTIONS

- 1. Continually implement actions that focus on three critical youth connection time periods
 - a. Their childhood and teenage years while still residing in Kulinactions that build a sense of connection, affection, attachment and pride for their Kulin hometown e.g. diversity of youth relevant facilities, programs and experiences.
 - b. That time period they go away to study, work and/or travel the wider world- actions that create a sense of connection and being valued and missed e.g., regular news and communications, invitations to hometown events etc.
 - c. That 25-35 year old age period when they make decisions about partnering, having a family, buying a house, starting a business-constant reminders of the opportunities and advantages of doing such life experiences in Kulin- including organisation of reunions that bring people home.

Timeframe: Immedidate & Ongoing

2. Continually identify local young people for recognition and participation in regional, state national and international award schemes and personal and leadership development programs.

ACTIONS

3. Undertake research into housing, land, property investment and subdivision development initiatives happening in other small rural communities.

Timeframe: Immediate to short term

4. Explore resourcing options and state government funding.

Timeframe: Immediate to short term

5. Develop and implement a Housing, Subdivision, Local Investment and Land Development Community-Driven Strategy that

encompasses short term worker, family and aged housing options.

Timeframe: Short to medium term

6. Undertake conversations with Housing Authority re criteria for social housing to ensure individuals and families in genuine housing need gain access not weekenders.

Timeframe: Immediate
