### VISION

Farming and rural communities are safeguarded to ensure their sustainability before, during and after natural disasters.

### MISSION

To provide economic and empathic assistance to rural communities impacted by natural disaster by partnering with key stakeholders to deliver meaningful outcomes.





Across the country, farmers and communities have faced rapidly changing climatic conditions. This year brought both wet and dry periods, with each posing their own unique but significant challenges. Western Australia, South Australia, and the East Coast experienced dry conditions early in the year, while parts of the East Coast faced increased rainfall later, highlighting the diverse climatic challenges faced by farmers.

This year, **Rural Aid** has supported numerous communities through cascading disasters. For instance, state-wide storms in Victoria caused significant damage, particularly in Gippsland, where farmers experienced bushfires one day and overnight were faced with multiple flooding events. Rural Aid provided initial bushfire and flood support and continued assistance throughout recovery and subsequent disaster events as we worked closely with these impacted families.

**Rural Aid's Farm Recovery** events, supported by staff and volunteers, have helped farming communities such as Tara, Qld and Willawarrin, NSW. These rural areas have weathered years of challenging conditions. While practical recovery support is vital, the impact of these events goes beyond this as the mental health benefits of being cared for by the wider community are equally significant. By purchasing project materials locally, securing paid accommodation for volunteers, and partnering with local groups for meals, **Rural Aid** injects valuable funds into these communities, further strengthening their local economy.

At Rural Aid, we recognise the complexity of disasters, understanding that farmers and communities may simultaneously recover from one disaster while preparing for another.

Rural Aid is active in all stages of the disaster lifecycle, extending support beyond the initial response to long-term recovery.



Rural Aid's Financial support helps farmers when they're impacted by disaster. For example, the varroa mite devastated many bee farmers, affecting their income streams.

One impacted farmer said that thanks to Rural Aid's financial support, they could cover essentials like groceries during the time when they had no income.

The Varroa mite's impact went beyond honey shortages, causing ripple effects across the farming community and threatening livelihoods.





### EDUCATION FUNDING

Our recent Pulse of the Paddock survey showed that more than 60% of respondents are already practising sustainable farming, and many farmers are eager to learn more.

By focusing on locally informed practices, we support sustainable and regenerative agriculture, enhancing livelihoods, promoting food security, and protecting the environment. Recognising that preparedness is crucial in mitigating the impacts of disasters, we are committed to equipping our farmers with the skills and knowledge needed to adapt and thrive.

To further support this effort, we recently introduced funding for farmers to attend educational courses, empowering them to strengthen their resilience and preparedness in the face of future challenges.

Community Development is a process of bringing communities together through shared passion to create the change they desire. It uses humanity's most valuable tool, conversations, to inspire hope and creativity.

Rural Aid's Community Development Program, in partnership with Peter Kenyon from the Bank of I.D.E.A.S is supporting small rural towns to transform themselves into thriving, self-reliant communities who feel empowered to shape their own futures. By developing unique action plans through the Asset-Based Community Development (ABCD) approach, towns focus on their existing strengths rather than deficits. This shift in thinking promotes active participation and a sense of ownership over the town's future, fostering resilience and adaptability..

This year Rural Aid continued our ongoing work with our Community Builders in the Western Australia's North Midlands and Wheatbelt areas. It also marked the launch of the Community Builders Program in Central Queensland and the Hunter region of New South Wales.

Rural Aid continues to support numerous individual rural communities through its programs.

#### CASE STUDY: WAGIN'S (WA) JOURNEY TO COMMUNITY-LED CHANGE AND RESILIENCE

Since joining Rural Aid's Community Builders Program in 2021, Wagin has made significant strides, including the "Co-Operative Care Wagin" project. The project grew out of the town's passion for their older people and concern that as people in Wagin age, they are forced to leave town in search of additional care. Wagin's 'ageing in place' initiative, Co-Operative Care Wagin, will use a co-operative model to connect local needs with local resources. Not only will this help keep people in town for longer and improve wellbeing,

it also generates opportunities for sustainable employment and economic growth within the town. Co-Operative Care Wagin, the only one of its kind in WA is supported by Care Together and guided by experts like Peter Westoby. A co-op formation meeting is planned for November.

Through proactive leadership and community-driven initiatives, Wagin is building a more resilient future.

Mustering Growth celebrates the strengths needed to grow up in the bush and builds coping skills for the unique challenges faced by rural kids.
